



LastPass is a Password Manager that has an **Emergency Access** feature, where you can:

1. **Designate trusted contacts** by choosing one or more LastPass users to be able to request access to your vault.
2. **Set a wait time** for how long LastPass should wait before giving your trusted contact access after they send a request. During this time, LastPass notifies you, so you can decline access if you are alive & well.
3. **Limit access** by allowing contacts to view the items in your vault without modifying account details or deleting any content.

Emergency Access is only available with Premium and Families accounts.

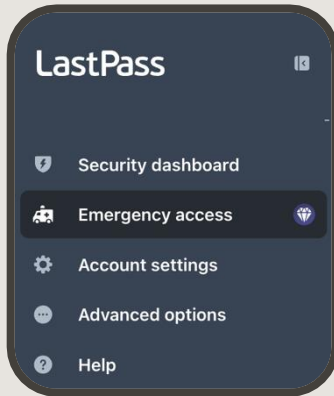

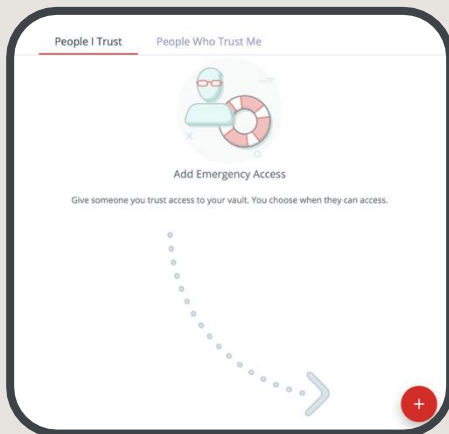

Emergency Access

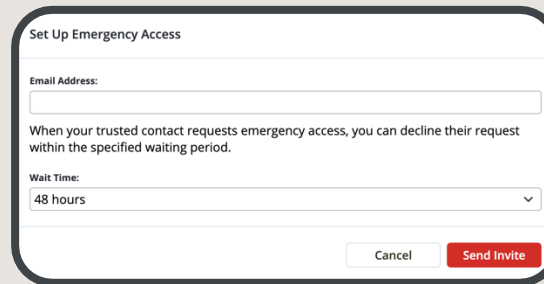
- 1 From the main page, select **Emergency Access** on the left-side panel.



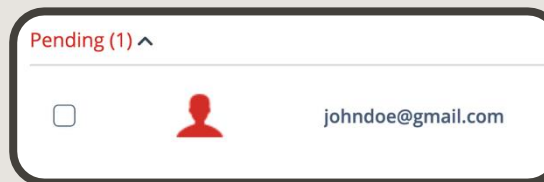
- 2 With *People I Trust* selected, tap the **+** icon in the bottom-right corner to add a new contact.



- 3 Enter the **email** of your emergency contact, specify the **wait time**, then select **Send Invite**.
 - When your contact requests access, you can still decline their request within the waiting period you specify.
 - **Note:** The email you enter here must be the email your contact uses for their LastPass account. If the email you enter isn't linked to a LastPass account, this will result in an error.



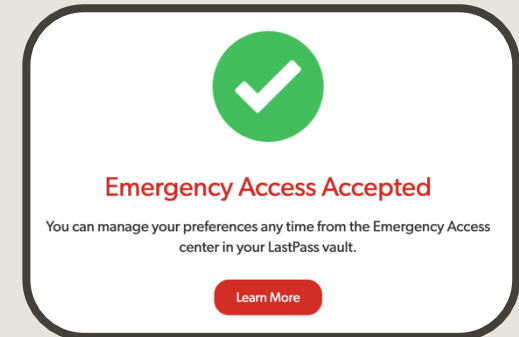
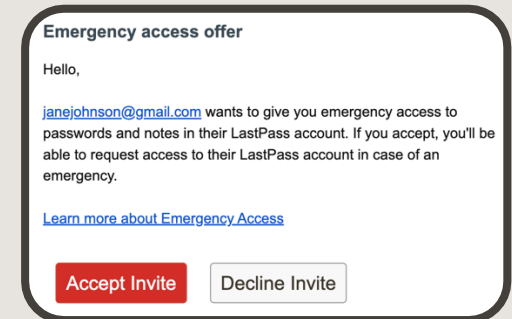
- 4 You will see the contact you just added appear as **Pending**.



Revoking Access: You can revoke Emergency Access from a trusted contact at any time. A trusted contact can also choose to remove themselves as your trusted contact.

- 5 Let your **contact know** they need to accept the invitation in their email.

Without Emergency Contacts

LastPass does not have a legacy access feature. Without Emergency Access, no one can access your vault. LastPass cannot recover your master password, so all stored information will be inaccessible.
